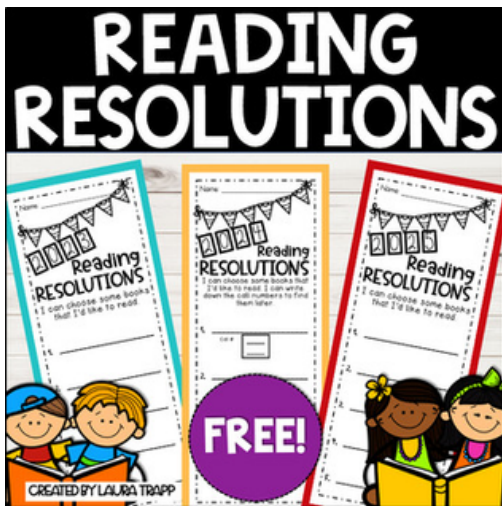




12 ELEMENTARY LIBRARY IDEAS FOR JANUARY

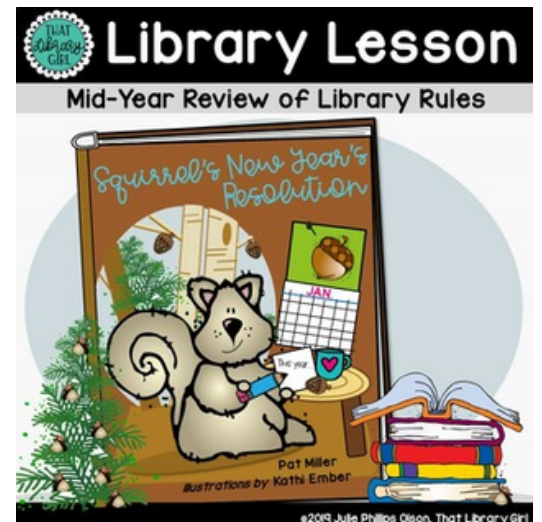
Idea #3: Refresh Library Rules and Book Care

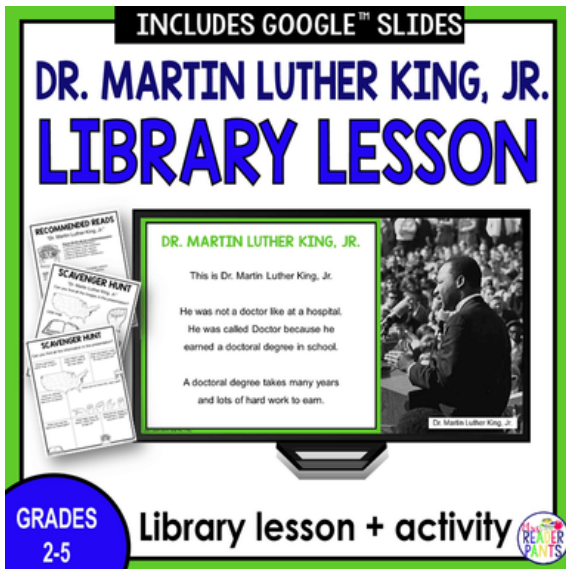
Get creative with a snowman book sculpture!

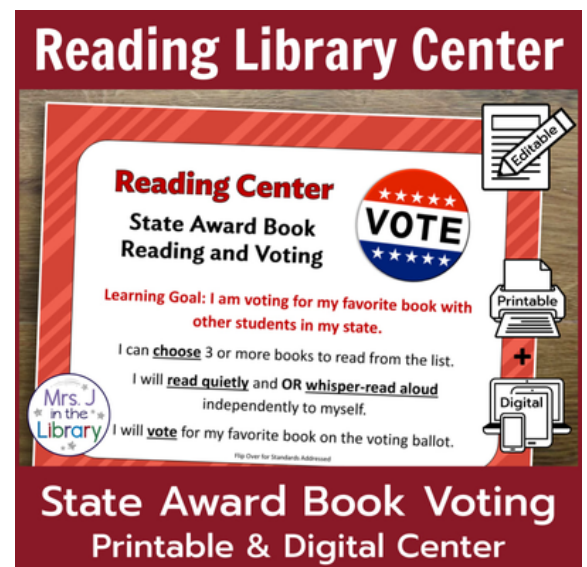
Idea #8: Promote State Award Books

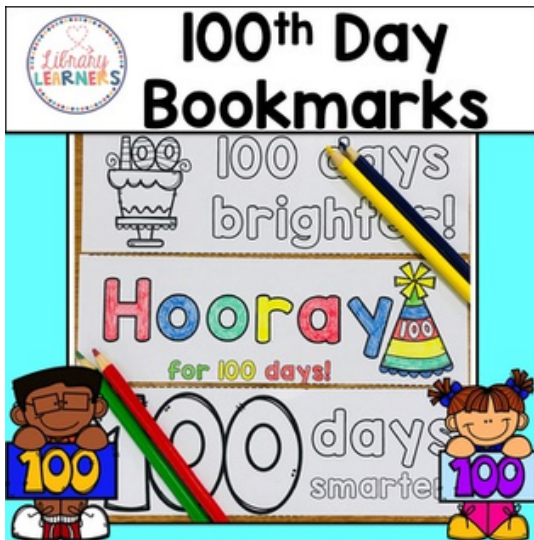
