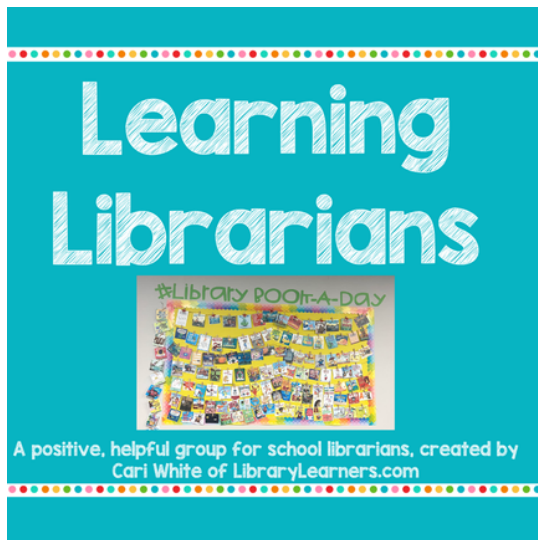

Idea #3: Collaborate with Other Librarians

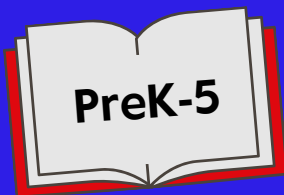

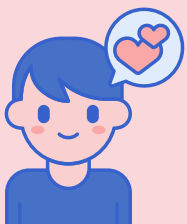

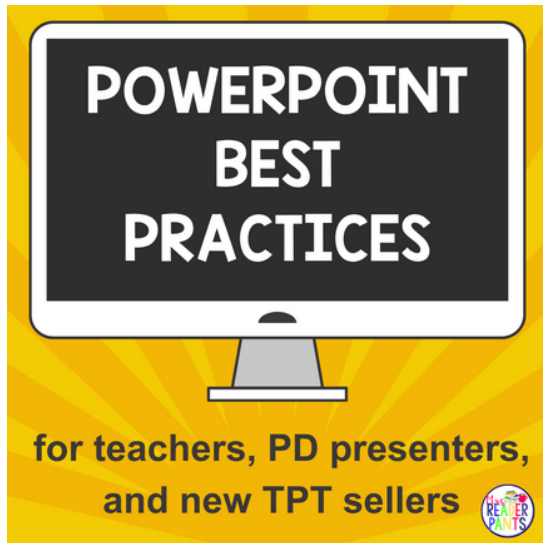
